### Your right to request a meeting with the school's governing body

The Schools Standards and Organisation (Wales) Act 2013 removed the requirement for school governing bodies to hold an annual meeting with parents. Instead, new arrangements were introduced to enable parents to request up to 3 meetings in any school year with the governing body, on matters which are of concern to them. If parents wish to use their rights under the Act to hold a meeting, four conditions will need to be satisfied:

#### 1. Parents will need to raise a petition in support of holding a meeting.

The parents of at least 30 registered pupils will need to sign the petition. If it is a paper petition, then a parent's written signature must be given as well as the name and class of each of their children who are registered pupils at the school. If the petition is in electronic format, the 'signature' required is the typed name of the parent plus the name and class of each child who is a registered pupil at the school and the email address of each parent who 'signs' the electronic petition.

#### 2. The meeting must be called to discuss matters which affect the school.

The meeting cannot be called to discuss such matters as the progress of individual pupils, or to make a complaint against a member of the school's staff or governing body. The petition should contain brief details of the matter or matters to be discussed, and the reasons for calling the meeting. This information should be clearly displayed at the top of the petition, with parents' signatures appearing below.

#### 3. A maximum of 3 meetings can be held during the school year.

The law allows parents to use their rights to request up to 3 meetings with a school governing body during the school year.

#### 4. There must be at least 25 school days left in the school year.

The law makes it a condition that at least 25 school days are left in the school year when the petition is received so that the meeting can be held. A "school day" means a day when the school is open to pupils: it does not include weekends, public holidays, school holidays or INSET days.

# <u>Attendance</u>

At Ysgol Bryn Alyn we are committed to providing a full and effective education to all pupils and we embrace the concept of equal opportunities for all.

For a child to reach his/her full educational achievement a high level of school attendance is essential.

The school works consistently towards a goal of 100% attendance for all children. Every opportunity is used to convey to pupils and their parents or carers the importance of regular and punctual attendance.

Attendance has been a challenge for both school and parents due to the COVID pandemic. Howev-



er, following Welsh Government guidance we work with parents to ensure the best possible attendance for all students.

Our target for attendance is 96% and our attendance officer is in daily contact with families for those pupils who do not attend school. We monitor pupil attendance each lesson and follow up on pupils who do not attend.

### **Rewards**

There are a number of awards that pupils can strive for over the academic year. These include teacher nominated 'Star Awards' for pupils working hard in their lessons (awarded every half term), 'Getting it Right' awards (termly), recognising pupils who consistently get it right every day and support our school REACH values and our REACH awards, presented yearly.

Our REACH Awards – our presented in Celebration assemblies at the end of the academic year. These awards are based on our REACH values and pupils are nominated by teaching staff, Heads of Year and SLT. 317 pupils were nominated across all 5 categories in the academic year 2020 - 2021. All nominees received a certificate and winners (those pupils with the most votes) received specially designed badges, certificates, and YBA stationary. Both school Minibuses drove around the community in convoy. This 'alternative' reward ceremony continues to be well received by our YBA community and it is a fitting end for staff to thank our Year 11 pupils for the effort they have put in.

### Pupil Surveys

We continually strive to find out how our pupils are feeling about school, either verbally or through pupil questionnaires. Our ESTYN style survey sent out in June 2021 meant we were able to compare our pupil responses to the ESTYN national norms (data comparison with most recent ESTYN responses.


As you can see on many questions we are above the national norms. The yellow highlighted questions were additions (and therefore no comparison available) to find out how our pupils felt about attendance/punctuality and their COVID safety at YBA.

Pupil Voice is also heard via our School Council which is elected from the pupil body on a yearly basis. Lead by the Head Pupils and the prefect team, the Council met regularly even during lock-down where attendance was via Google Meet. The Head Pupils also met regularly with the YBA Governing body. Following on from pupil survey responses, the School Council were actively en-



#### **Pastoral Support**

Ysgol Bryn Alyn prioritises the pastoral support of our pupils. During our COVID lockdowns we attempted weekly contact with all pupils by either their form tutor/Head of Year/support assistant/ behaviour manager/subject teacher/SLT on a weekly basis. With the development of live form time and Google Meet, there was a variety of ways in which we could track our pupils. Any concerns or support requirements were immediately flagged up to the Pastoral Team via Heads of Year, DSL or DHT where agreed processes could be followed. A Wellbeing Tracker could be accessed by all staff so that everyone can have access to centralised wellbeing information to support each individual pupil.



Through Form Slides and assemblies both in school and during lockdown, we could continue to signpost our pupils to help and support from mindfulness exercises to wellbeing bingo!

Pastoral Year Group Google Classrooms continued to support all pupils and they could contact their form tutors through to our Headteacher, Mrs Slinn. They were an inval-

uable way of communicating information to year groups, posting wellbeing support, presenting assemblies, engaging with activities/competitions outside of the school curriculum, giving careers advice, posting videos to support the anxiety that the pupils had about returning to school.

Ysgol Bryn Alyn also continued to engage with their Transition pupils from local primary schools via the Transition Google Classroom to ensure that COVID did not prevent contact between key staff and our new intake of Year 7 pupils.

#### House System Development

Our House System has begun to take shape and will be launched during the academic year 2021—2022. Pupils have been involved by researching and nominating names for houses which have recently been confirmed as...

**Glyndwr House**—named after Owain Glyndwr, the last native Welshman to hold the title Prince of Wales.

**Llywelyn House**—named after Llywelyn ap Gruffudd, King of Gwynedd and ruler of all wales for 45 years (1173—1240)


**Campbell House**—named after Betty Campbell (1934—2017), Wales' first black headteacher and champion of multiculturalism education.

**Morgan House**—named after Williams Morgan (1545—1604). He translated the whole Bible into Welsh from Greek and Hebrew.

**Cadwaladr House** - named after Betsi Cadwaladr (1789—1860) a nurse who worked alongside Florence Nightingale during the Crimean War, inspiring improvements in health and wellbeing. **Gwenllian House**—Named after Gwenllian ferch Gruffydd (1100-1136) who is the only known example of a medieval period woman leading a Welsh army into battle.



YBA has had a very active Facebook page, where information from school is shared, useful signposting for local agencies can been seen and pupil/school successes can be shared. This was invaluable during lockdown and was celebrated by many of our parents.


### **Teaching And Learning**



Providing pupils with a broad range of learning experiences is a key priority at Ysgol Bryn Alyn so that they develop the skills and knowledge required to be ambitious, capable learners who are ready to learn throughout their lives.

As for all teachers and pupils the last 18 months has been a learning experience for us all and the successful use of Google Classroom to provide on-line learning during lockdown developed pupils' and staffs' digital competencies, as well as developing independence and resilience within our learners.





In the classroom, our key focus, particularly at Key Stage 3 has been on developing literacy and numeracy skills with an emphasis on oracy and extended writing. Effective modelling and targeted support through structure slips is allowing pupils to communicate effectively and apply their knowledge in different contexts, such as Write Like A Historian. We are really proud of the wonderful work our pupils are producing.

The introduction of our REACH Challenge system allows all of our students to challenge themselves to be the very best they can be. The new system clearly highlights the level of challenge of set learning tasks via labels from bronze, through to silver and gold. Beyond that, Ysgol Bryn Alyn's most able and






ambitious students are encouraged to attempt 'REACH' challenges, which demonstrate they are working and learning at the top of their game. Staff encourage students to become independent learners by guiding them to the appropriate level of challenge.

In terms of Curriculum Provision this will be all change for our New Year 7 Learners from September 2021 as the school transitions into delivering the New Curriculum For Wales (NCfW). This is an exciting time for our staff and pupils. Our new Year 7 learners have already completed an on-line questionnaire via our transition google classroom on how they like to learn and their areas of interest.

Teachers at Ysgol Bryn Alyn are passionate about ensuring that are pupils undertake a wide range of learning and teaching experiences despite the restrictions of the current COVID pandemic and the introduction of Spanish, Drama and Dance at both KS3 and KS4 have added a further dimension to our vibrant school.





# **Healthy Schools**

Sport and exercise have a major impact on many aspects of life. Sport can enhance community spirit, equality of opportunity, personal and social development and social integration.

At Ysgol Bryn Alyn, we aim to maximise the sporting opportunities for all our pupils through team sports and individual sporting activities.

### Wrexham Healthy Schools Scheme

The Healthy Schools Scheme is an integral part of Wrexham County Boroughs' Children and Young People's service, within Lifelong learning.

We are committed to promoting and protecting the health and well-being of children and young people through health promotion activity and programmes in Schools.

#### What is a Healthy School?

A health promoting school is one which actively promotes and protects the physical, mental and social health and well being of its community through positive action by such means as policy, strategic planning and staff development with regard to its curriculum, ethos, physical environment and community relations.

Wrexham's Healthy Schools Scheme was launched in 2002, and is a member of the Welsh Network of Healthy School Schemes. The scheme was accredited by the Welsh Assembly Government in 2003. The Scheme is a partnership between Health and Education, which recognises that there are mutual benefits in young people's health and attainments to be gained.

The scheme demonstrates commitment to supporting and encouraging the growth and implementation of the Personal and Social Education (PSE) framework in schools, in addition to ensuring that national health priorities are considered in the daily life of the school for pupils, staff and the wider community.

#### How are schools supported?

In Wrexham there is a team of officers dedicated to supporting schools in developing the healthy school scheme.

Schools are supported in developing actions to meet their identified needs, which are planned with clear achievement criteria and methods for monitoring and evaluation following the Ten Point Plan and working towards the National Quality Award. Local networking is facilitated between schools and health organisations and training opportunities are made available for staff.


Typically schools undertake an assessment annually and are accredited for each year of successful participation in the scheme. Schools are awarded their plaque/certificate at the annual celebration event.

The catering team at Ysgol Bryn Alyn provide a wide range of nutritionally balanced menu choices throughout the day for all our pupils, using basic wholesome ingredients. Our menus comply with the nutritional standards for school

lunches set by the Welsh Government. We comply with the new regulations for allergens with allergen information at each till point.

There is a three week cycle menu which includes vegetarian choices; packed lunches are also available on request. There is a pre order facility which helps cut down waiting time for pupils.







### Cwricwlwm Cymraeg

With the exception of Welsh and Spanish, all lessons at Bryn Alyn are delivered in English, however, every department is responsible for promoting the Welsh language and culture.

Pupils have Welsh lessons from year 7 and it is compulsory for pupils to continue learning Welsh into KS4. Many staff greet the pupils in Welsh.

We celebrate our Welsh heritage in our annual Eisteddfod to mark Dydd Gŵyl Dewi.

Signage around the school is Bilingual.



#### Welsh Speakers in School

Last year a strategy to double the number of Welsh speakers in the next 30 years was published by the Welsh Government. With this in mind and in light of the high level of fluency expected from our pupils studying the new Welsh GCSE, we like to promote the importance of the Welsh language as much as possible.

All Welsh speaking staff wear lanyards and badges which identify them to pupils.

Pupils know that whenever they see a member of staff or indeed a fellow pupil wearing the lanyard and/ or badge, that they can practice their Welsh.

This is to improve the use of incidental Welsh in and around the school.



# **Additional Needs Provision**

Ms Jasmin Morgan, the Additional Learning Needs Co-ordinator (ALNco) and the Learning Support Team provide support for students with Additional Learning Needs.

Support is provided for pupils in mainstream lessons as well as small group and one-to-one provision. A wide variety of additional needs is catered for, ranging from medical, learning, speech and language, ASD, emotional and social difficulties.

The school works closely with other professionals such as the Educational Psychologist, Behaviour Support, Speech Therapists and the School Nurse to ensure that the individual needs of the pupils are met.

Regular review meetings are held, involving all parties concerned, to assess, monitor progress and establish new targets and individual plans.

We have excellent links with cluster Primary Schools to help ensure a smooth and successful transition for ALN pupils.

At Ysgol Bryn Alyn our MAT cohort are identified via CAT testing, prior attainment and teacher recommendation. The lists of MAT pupils are regularly reviewed and shared with teachers.

Enrichment opportunities run throughout the year including the SEREN project which allows students to excel and experience opportunities for their future careers. It has also funded in-house extra-curricular opportunities for MAT pupils in Science and an on-going Latin class.
