#### Your right to request a meeting with the school's governing body

The Schools Standards and Organisation (Wales) Act 2013 removed the requirement for school governing bodies to hold an annual meeting with parents. Instead, new arrangements were introduced to enable parents to request up to 3 meetings in any school year with the governing body, on matters which are of concern to them. If parents wish to use their rights under the Act to hold a meeting, four conditions will need to be satisfied:

#### 1. Parents will need to raise a petition in support of holding a meeting.

The parents of at least 30 registered pupils will need to sign the petition. If it is a paper petition, then a parent's written signature must be given as well as the name and class of each of their children who are registered pupils at the school. If the petition is in electronic format, the 'signature' required is the typed name of the parent plus the name and class of each child who is a registered pupil at the school and the email address of each parent who 'signs' the electronic petition.

#### 2. The meeting must be called to discuss matters which affect the school.

The meeting cannot be called to discuss such matters as the progress of individual pupils, or to make a complaint against a member of the school's staff or governing body. The petition should contain brief details of the matter or matters to be discussed, and the reasons for calling the meeting. This information should be clearly displayed at the top of the petition, with parents' signatures appearing below.

#### 3. A maximum of 3 meetings can be held during the school year.

The law allows parents to use their rights to request up to 3 meetings with a school governing body during the school year.

#### 4. There must be at least 25 school days left in the school year.

The law makes it a condition that at least 25 school days are left in the school year when the petition is received so that the meeting can be held. A "school day" means a day when the school is open to pupils: it does not include weekends, public holidays, school holidays or INSET days.

We have excellent relationships with our feeder schools and enjoy regular contact through curricular and pastoral links. We provide an enhanced transition programme for those pupils who need extra support and guidance with the transition to secondary school. We held Year 5/6 Extravaganza days in September 2021 to support the transition work. Here pupils from primary school took part in Faculty lead activities (including a History re-enactment of the Spanish Armada, Street Dance, Rocket Launching and problem solving). It was a great opportunity for our pupils to meet some of our staff and take part in an event on the school grounds.

'The pupils in year 5 and 6 recently attended an 'Extravaganza Day' and experienced outdoor activities within their bubbles. Although, they could not mix with other primaries, they met other pupils visually, at a distance. All of the pupils had an excellent day, and were very excited about going to YBA in the future.'

Black Lane also commented further on transition activities

'YBA ensure that our pupils are supported well with transition to secondary school. Our pupils feel connected and know who key members of staff are. They are well informed about key information and expectations of YBA and know they can talk about any questions they have at any time. Key information about the needs of individuals and their families is passed on so that provision can be put in place to support a smooth transition.'



The Additional Learning Needs department runs an Afasic week during the summer term for pupils in year six who require additional academic support. This week runs into the CTD where we created a 'transition tree' of hopes and dreams in our pupil entrance where our new pupils added their hopes and dreams for their time at YBA. It will serve as a reminder to them for their next 5 years.

We have continued to develop our links with the local community by producing a bi-annual 'cluster newsletter' in conjunction with the primary schools. The newsletter includes news and events from

the local resource centre, Alyn Waters Country Park and Gwyn Evans Sports Centre as well as the Primary Schools.

### **Attendance**

At Ysgol Bryn Alyn we are committed to providing a full and effective education to all pupils and we embrace the concept of equal opportunities for all.

For a child to reach his/her full educational achievement a high level of school attendance is essential. The school works consistently towards a goal of 100% attendance for all children. Every opportunity is used to convey to pupils and their parents or carers the importance of regular and punctual attendance.

Attendance has been a challenge for both school and parents due to the COVID pandemic. However, following Welsh Government guidance we work with parents to ensure the best possible attendance for all students.

Our target for attendance is 96% and our attendance officer is in daily contact with families for those pupils who do not attend school. We monitor pupil attendance each lesson and follow up on pupils who do not attend ensuring that both pupils and parents/carers are supported with targeted interventions where necessary.

We are delighted that our collaborative work with parents/carers is demonstrating a positive trend in YBA Attendance statistics since the difficulties that the COVID pandemic presented for attendance. Communication is strong due to our EDULINK App where parents/carers can easily report absences. We continue to work with parents/carers to encourage medical appointments and holidays are taken during holiday time (where possible) altering our parent information to include the

impact of absences on their child.

Information is regularly sent out to parents regarding attendance and the importance of it. Our new ESW has been very proactive since starting in the summer term at engaging with pupils and parents. The Headteacher has authorised/unauthorised the holiday request for the reasons specified above. Please see attached attendance registration certificate.

Read the information below carefully. There can be detrimental loss of learning due to taking your child out of school.

It is vital that pupils strive to have the best attendance possible so that they have access to learning opportunities. There is a proven link to GCSE success and attendance, so all pupils need to develop good habits to attend school every day and on time.

Your child has 175 days in the year where they are NOT in school – that is plenty of time for visits, holidays, and other appointments.

Try to support your child develop good attendance habits as there can be a huge impact on learning when you consider the number of lessons that could be missed. The biggest % of these lessons will be Maths, English and Science, therefore, it is clear the possible negative impact on lost learning for your child (see information below)

190 school days in each year = attend all / no lessons missed = 100%. Your child has the best chance of success.

**180** days = **10** days absence / <u>50 lessons missed</u> = **95% attendance**. Striving to ensure that any absences do not have a detrimental effect on your child's education.

171 days = 19 days absence / <u>95 lessons missed</u> = 90% attendance. Less chance of success at GCSE level (even if in lower school years). Possible Fixed Penalty notice issued following YBA attendance processes.

161 days = 29 days absence / 145 lessons missed = 85% attendance. Not accessing key learning opportunities and a possible stressor for your child having missed vital work (coursework, exam preparation, introduction to new learning topics). Fixed Penalty notices issued and Education Social Worker involvement.
Most young people with absence rates below 85% fail to achieve five or more good grades at GCSE and around one third of these achieve no GCSEs at all.

152 days = 38 days absence / <u>190 lessons missed</u> = 80% attendance. This is VERY poor attendance and has a serious impact on education as well as reducing life chances for your child. Court action could be taken by the Local Authority ESW team following a YBA referral as per our attendance policy. As a school we would be particularly concerned about the negative impact of this absence on your child not only with their learning but more importantly on their wellbeing. This amount of absence creates an increased workload for catch up as well as adding considerable additional stress on your child. For example, they may find it difficult to make and maintain friendships, have feelings of isolation as they have poorer academic performance and then go on to develop poor mental health as a result.

Remember, if your child is in Years 10 or 11 and **misses an external exam** for reasons that cannot be professionally evidenced (e.g., GP, Consultant letter), then **you will be charged the entry fee**. As a school we pay for every exam that your child is entered for and we will, therefore, pass this cost on to you (approx. £40 per entry).

PRACTISE PRESENCE at YBA, it makes the difference to your child's life chances.

### 100% Attendance

Pupils are awarded certificates half termly for achieving 100% attendance. If they go on to achieve 100% attendance at the end of a full term, then they are awarded a coloured 100% attendance badge and they are put into a prize draw. Improvement in attendance is also celebrated. We are also focusing on attendance improvers so that every pupil has the chance to achieve.



### **Rewards**

There are a number of awards that pupils can strive for over the academic year. These include teacher nominated 'Star Awards' for pupils working hard in their lessons (awarded every half term), Each form tutor nominates two pupils from their form for a Headteacher Award every half term. These are pupils who play an active part in our YBA community, demonstrating our REACH values and being an exemplary YBA citizen.

Our REACH Awards – are presented in Celebration assemblies at the end of the academic year. These awards are based on our REACH values and pupils are nominated by teaching staff, Heads of Year and SLT. We continued with our 'On Tour' REACH awards (following on from our very successful visits to pupil homes last year) for all year groups. Heads of Year, some subject staff/form tutors and SLT 'dropped in' as a surprise to pupil homes to present them with their exemplary YBA award (check out our On Tour video on our YouTube channel by clicking here)

Resilience (HoY nominated),

Effort - 118 nominations

Aspiration 100 nominations

Co-operation 106 nominations

Honour (nominated by HoY and SLT).

344 pupils were nominated across all 5 categories in the academic year 2022 - 2023. All nominees received a certificate and winners (those pupils with the most votes) received specially designed certificates, and YBA station-



ary, as our school minibus drove around the community in convoy. This 'alternative' reward ceremony continues to be well received by our YBA community and it is a fitting end for staff to thank our pupils for the effort they have put in.

### Pupil Surveys

We continually strive to find out how our pupils are feeling about school, either verbally or through pupil questionnaires. During this academic year our pupils have completed the PASS survey. The success of young people's educational experience is heavily determined by the attitudes that they bring to their learning, their sense of aspiration and the feelings they have about their place in the broader social context of the school. The *PASS* diagnostic is multi-factorial measure of student attitudes to school, learning and success. Its robust nature enables the data it yields to be used as a means of establishing baselines and to support effective planning, implementation and evaluation of interventions at individual, group and whole school levels This data is allowing Heads of Year to signpost relevant interventions for individuals. PASS supports YBA to

- Establish our students' perceptions of their school and learning experience;
- Help teaching staff, support staff and senior leaders to challenge their own assumptions about the school and its students;
- Respond to improvement needs as identified by the students;
- Inform teaching and learning strategies and intervention programmes to help raise standards of attainment and student well-being;
- Address challenging behaviour
- Address attendance issues through the identification of underlying factors as well identifying those most risk at of becoming alienated;
- Support emotionally vulnerable young people and those with possible mental health issues, to ensure those most at risk do not slip through the net;
- Provide an objective means for joint collaborative problem-solving, working with parents, carers and extended families, external agencies and other professionals supporting young people.

These help YBA to ensure that the appropriate actions are put in place for improvement, especially following the Statutory Framework from Welsh Government on Emotional Health and Wellbeing





#### Pastoral Support

Ysgol Bryn Alyn prioritises the pastoral support of our pupils. Our Pastoral care begins with our form tutors in their dedicated time at the start of each day. This provides our pupils with clear routines to set them up for the day. Through Form Slides and assemblies, we continue to signpost our pupils to help and support from mindfulness exercises to aspirational role models!



YBA REACH Values: Resilience, Effort, Aspiration, Cooperation, Honour

Many pupils know which member of staff / team of staff can help them or their friends with their emotional or mental well-being and many feel that there are lots of resources in school to support their emotional and mental well-being. YBA has also taken part in a number of national and local priorities to promote Emotional Health & Wellbeing .e.g. Anti-bullying week and Mental Health Week . Our focus on a Trauma Informed Approach this year has helped staff building positive relationships following on whole staff training in September 2023 and we are lucky to have two newly qualified TiS Practitioners in school who can support both staff and pupils with this approach.

YBA continues to develop support for the school community's wellbeing through a large variety of interventions such as trained staff and outside agency involvement examples being 1-1 support from school counsellor, group therapy work with the Youth Workers (HACK and Your Friend Work-

shops), Health Improvement Team working with parents, organised by our Family Engagement Officer, Lego Therapy, regular intervention work with groups and individuals by our SLO. Training has been given to a group of pupils to support their peers,

Our Pastoral Hub, following the appointment of our new support worker is developing into a structured and signposting area for vulnerable, anxious and pupils with other emotional and social issues.



YBA has had a very active Facebook page, where information from school is shared, useful signposting for local agencies can been seen and pupil/school successes can be shared. This

# **Teaching And Learning**



At YBA we aim for all students to fully engage with the learning process. As leaders of learning in the classroom we strive to engage, motivate, support, direct and assess learners as they progress in their learning.

Learning at YBA is viewed as pupils' development of knowledge and skills which reflect the ever -changing demands of the local and the wider global community our pupils are part of.

We aim to equip pupils with knowledge and a set of skills, appropriate to their age and ability to help them communicate and function positively as young adults.

Our focus in L&T is based upon direct teaching supported by ongoing targeted live feedback. Following initial modelling/quality explanations, students are then given structured tasks to practice the new information culminating in independent work (The S.W.A.T task). We believe our model reflects the four purposes of the Curriculum for Wales.

To support pupils to DREAM, REACH, ACHIEVE lessons at YBA are structured and delivered via the YBA 5 Part Lesson.



Decreasing but targeted teacher support provided by adaptive teaching strategies.

Pupils are supported in their learning through regular feedback. This may be in the form of live marking, verbal or written feedback.

In every lesson at YBA we aim to:

- Create a safe and nurturing classroom environment.
- Ensure pupils know what success looks like and model expectations.
- Pupils have the opportunity to practice new learning to ensure high success rate.
- Questioning and feedback moves the learner forward.
- Pupils and teacher reflect on their learning in a structured way.

# **Healthy Schools**

Sport and exercise have a major impact on many aspects of life. Sport can enhance community spirit, equality of opportunity, personal and social development and social integration.

At Ysgol Bryn Alyn, we aim to maximise the sporting opportunities for all our pupils through team sports and individual sporting activities.



During the autumn term pupils have/will experience the following activities: Football and rugby (boys only), netball (girls only), basketball, badminton, gymnastics, swimming and health related fitness (HRE).

Wrexham's Healthy Schools Scheme was launched in 2002, and is a member of the Welsh Network of Healthy School Schemes. The scheme was accredited by the Welsh Assembly Government in 2003. The Scheme is a partnership between Health and Education, which recognises that there are mutual benefits in young people's health and attainments to be gained.

The scheme demonstrates commitment to supporting and encouraging the growth and implementation of the Personal and Social Education (PSE) framework in schools, in addition to ensuring that national health priorities are considered in the daily life of the school for pupils, staff and the wider community.

#### How are schools supported?

In Wrexham there is a team of officers dedicated to supporting schools in developing the healthy school scheme.

Schools are supported in developing actions to meet their identified needs, which are planned with clear achievement criteria and methods for monitoring and evaluation following the Ten Point Plan and working towards the National Quality Award. Local networking is facilitated between schools and health organisations and training opportunities are made available for staff.

Typically schools undertake an assessment annually and are accredited for each year of successful participation in the scheme. Schools are awarded their plaque/certificate at the annual celebration event.

The catering team at Ysgol Bryn Alyn provide a wide range of nutritionally balanced menu choices throughout the day for all our pupils, using basic wholesome ingredients. Our menus comply with the nutritional standards for school

lunches set by the Welsh Government. We comply with the new regulations for allergens with allergen information at each till point.

There is a three week cycle menu which includes vegetarian choices; packed lunches are also available on request. There is a pre order facility which helps cut down waiting time for pupils.









### **Cwricwlwm Cymraeg**

With the exception of Welsh and Spanish, all lessons at Bryn Alyn are delivered in English, however, every department is responsible for promoting the Welsh language and culture.

Pupils have Welsh lessons from year 7 and it is compulsory for pupils to continue learning Welsh into KS4. Many staff greet the pupils in Welsh.

We celebrate our Welsh heritage in our annual Eisteddfod to mark Dydd Gŵyl Dewi.

Signage around the school is Bilingual.





# Additional Needs Provision

Ms Jasmin Morgan, the Additional Learning Needs Co-ordinator (ALNco) and the Learning Support Team provide support for students with Additional Learning Needs.

Support is provided for pupils in mainstream lessons as well as small group and one-to-one provision. A wide variety of additional needs is catered for, ranging from medical, learning, speech and language, ASD, emotional and social difficulties.

The school works closely with other professionals such as the Educational Psychologist, Behaviour Support, Speech Therapists and the School Nurse to ensure that the individual needs of the pupils are met.

Regular review meetings are held, involving all parties concerned, to assess, monitor progress and establish new targets and individual plans.

We have excellent links with cluster Primary Schools to help ensure a smooth and successful transition for ALN pupils.

At Ysgol Bryn Alyn our MAT cohort are identified via CAT testing, prior attainment and teacher recommendation. The lists of MAT pupils are regularly reviewed and shared with teachers.

Enrichment opportunities run throughout the year including the SEREN project which allows students to excel and experience opportunities for their future careers.
